Narrative Section

PROJECT SYNOPSIS

This report covers the work done between 01 February and 30 August 2016. The sites funded through this grant (receiving monthly tranches) were OLSH Outreach Project in Nzhelele Parish (Tzaneen); Ahanang Parish Based Care Organisation in Sebokeng Zone 14 parish (Johannesburg); Zanethemba Home Based Care in new Castle (Dundee) and Sizumndeni Care Centre in Umzumbe (Mariannhill). The Project focused on the 3 main themes, each with different subcategories. The 3 themes are Nutritional Support; Educational Support and Health. School Uniforms once-off project; TB screening; HIV counselling and Testing; Homework Assistance; Gardening projects and MVC winter blankets projects were the main focus during this project during this period.

ABOUT THE SITES SUPPORTED

Ahanang Parish Based Care Organisation was started by the parish of Zone 14 Sebokeng and with the help of the Franciscan priests and the Catholic Nurses Guild to respond to the crisis of HIV and AIDS. Home Based Care; HIV Testing and Care of OVC is the core business of Ahanang. Many young people have been trained and groomed by Ahanang over the years with the support of SACBC. There is a qualified and competent Child and Youth Care worker; HCT Counsellors; Community Health Workers that have been produced by Ahanang through the support of SACBC. 70% of the non-clinical cadre of all the government clinics in Sebokeng are former volunteers of Ahanang. The impact Ahanang has made in the lives of beneficiaries, community at large and staff members is huge.

OLSH Outreach is a project of Daughters of Our Lady and Sacred Heart, Nzhelele Parish in Limpopo, Vhembe District under the Diocese of Tzaneen. It was established in 2001 by Sr Mairead Kelleher and Fr Andre Bohas MSC, the project was known as Nzhelele Home Based Care working under the umbrella of the Sacred Heart Mission Clinic registration, until 2012 the project registered as an NPO as Parish of Nzhelele HIV/AIDS Response. The project has been working 36 surrounding

villages offering different services ranging from Home Based Care, OVC (after school care and early childhood development through the outreach programme), Awareness programme and HIV Counselling and Testing. This happens through the support of SACBC. The staff and management team have learnt various skills over the years. The support from SACBC has helped the project and the community of Nzhelele build a better life for vulnerable people who are from underprivileged households and affected and/or infected by HIV and AIDS.

Sizumndeni Care Centre was started

by a catholic nurse who worked at Mgai clinic to assist clients who defaulted treatment due to lack of transport; working in remote sugar cane farms and lack of health education. The services expanded to the care of orphans and other vulnerable groups of children and women. The villages served are Dulini, KK, Ifafa, Nkobeni, Maplazini, Zitendeni ezincane; KwaKlaga; Mathafeni and Siyanda. Sizumndeni works closely with Gobume High School; Ekubusisweni Primary School; Mahlaya Primary School & St Nivard's Combined Primary School. Sizumndeni staff are able to conduct symptomatic screening of TB and HIV Testing services, thanks to the training provided by SACBC. Once a year, caregivers and other staff enjoy a 2 day retreat, sponsored by SACBC to help lessen the burden carried by caregivers as they take care of other people.

Zanethemba Home Based Care is an association of the Roman Catholic Parish in Madadeni, Northern KZN in Amajuba District under the diocese of Dundee. It was established by Fr. Joseph Mango'ngo in year 2000 and registered as NPO the same year. Zanethemba HBC has been working the entire Madadeni Township and surrounding areas offering services ranging from Home Based Care; TB Screening and DOTS; OVC and Early Childhood development. Through the support of SACBC, Zanethemba HBC staff and management have learnt various skills. The support from SACBC has helped Zanethemba HBC and the community of Madadeni and surrounding areas to build a better life for children who are from resource-scarce households and those affected by AIDS and TB.

	All 285 children were screened for symptoms of TB using a questionnaire						
	We are proud to report that all the children registered in our programme attend						
	school and are progressing very well. The packs of sanitary towels; soap, tooth						
	paste and other cosmetics are helping to keep the children, especially girls at						
	school.						
	The garden at the centre is flourishing. Children are eating fresh vegetables from the garden. The gardening training given to the children and their involvement in						
	the big garden at the centre has enabled them to have confidence at their homes,						
	taking care of their gardens.

CHALLENGES

The crackdown on the provision of HIV testing services by the department of health has made it difficult to reach the community members who have no access to clinics and has negatively affected the programme.

Lack of funding to support income generating activities is also a stumbling block identified by the four sites.

Procurement of school uniforms exclusively through Pep Stores due to financial compliance issues, restricted the sites because the said chain store does not carry the different colours that the various schools use.

Sizumndeni and Zanethemba both reported that in spite of their efforts to educate children about HIV and the dangers of engaging in sex at an early age, the rate of teen pregnancy is still continuing to rise.

SUCCESS STORIES

Zanele Ndlovu from Section 3 Ezibayeni was left with two orphans Sinenhlanhla Ndlovu (13) and Samukelisiwe Ndlovu (13) and her daughter. She did not have an I.D book and the job to support her family. Zanethemba gave her food parcels to sustain them and we accompany her to apply for an ID and she got it. Samukelisiwe Ndlovu is now receiving government grant.

Through your funding, Zanethemba was able to help the Ndlovu's with food, school uniforms, clothing donated by care workers and the community. Zanele Ndlovu is now able

to buy food for her family because she is working now for Zanethemba HBC under Extended Public Works Program (EPWP) which is managed by Zanethemba HBC.

From Nzhelele:

In May 2016 we conducted the retreat for guardian at The Ultimate. We have selected 17 guardians who they have a serious challenge from their families. During the retreat one guardian from Tshirolwe by the name Mrs Musekwa Mukumela in the age of 75 year has confessed about her plan to commit suicide.

She is taking care of three vulnerable children, where the mother passed way. She has raised those children by herself and now the life is getting tough and tough. She said "she cannot sleep at night; she wakes up during midnight thinking about the life she is facing in the house. The problem is her children whose they have their own families. They demand the old lady to buy whatever they what for them. When failing to do so they start to make troubles for her.

They issue was taken to the police and the protection order was issued to her children; the problem stills continue. There is no proper house; she is trying to make a better house for vulnerable children but is not easy because her children comes and demand things from her.

With the retreat we held, during evaluation she said" this retreat helps me a lots now I can see that I am not the only one who has the problem. There are other people who are facing with more difficult situation than me. I have learn a lot from this retreat and I won't kill myself, as from now I am going to change my thinking."
